

14 Apartments at 135 Dore Road dismissed!

The application to build two large apartment blocks on Dore Road next to the doctor's surgery by Metropolitan Homes Limited has been dismissed by the Planning Inspector.

Over eighty residents attended the hearing in the Totley Brook United Reformed Church hall to support the objections, particularly from local residents Paul Millington and Aubrey Read, local councillors Colin Ross and Keith Hill and the Dore Village Society. It was felt by those who attended that the objections made at the hearing had an effective impact on its outcome and on the Inspector's consideration of the detrimental effect of the proposal on the character of Dore.

Giving reasons for his decision, the Inspector says in his letter that the character of the area would be damaged by the proposal because of the relatively high density of development, the height of the buildings, the magnitude of the massing effect of the two blocks, its excessive scale and that the proposed apartment blocks would dominate the site disproportionately in comparison with neighbouring buildings. He concludes that the development would not constitute sustainable development because its impact would create unacceptable harm to the character and appearance of the area that would continue long after the economic benefits of construction had faded.

Worryingly, he accepted that flats with habitable rooms, bedrooms, studies and kitchens, with windows less than 10 metres apart were acceptable because they had obscured glazing!

I am sure that the community heaves a collective sigh of relief at the outcome. It is assumed the developer will now continue with his proposal to develop the site for six detached houses, a fallback position he expressed as a preference at the hearing.

Dore neighbourhood plan

Dore Village Society wishes to thank readers for responding positively to the Neighbourhood Plan Questionnaire. There has been overwhelming support for carrying forward work on all the principal areas of concern previously contained in the Dore Village Design Statement. If you haven't yet responded you are urged to give your views online via the Survey Monkey site noted elsewhere in this edition of Dore to Door. Do not be put off, it is really easy to respond and will take only 5 minutes of your time!

About thirty people have been working on preparing the plan for four months and are being supported by planning officers from the Peak District Park Authority and Sheffield City Council. There has also been extensive public consultation on the former King Ecgbert School Site Planning Brief which is currently being analysed.

We are planning to have a full public consultation in the summer on draft proposals and policies on protecting the Peak Park, Sheffield Green Belt, conservation areas and archaeological sites, existing housing areas, open spaces and allotments, the village centre and traffic management.

However, because this process leads to the adoption of a statutory plan, Dore Village Society has to comply with the requirements of the Localism Act 2011 to 'promote the economic, social and environmental well being of the area.' Progress on the Plan now awaits the agreement of the Charity Commissioners to amend our written constitution so that we can comply.

Cllr Colin Ross said "This just shows what a concerted campaign can do to protect our area. I would like to pay tribute to all those involved in helping secure this result and to the many people who turned up at the hearing to support us in putting the case before the Inspector. The Dore Conservation Group, the Dore Village Society and your three local Councillors all made significant contributions. However it's not over yet, I have no details as yet but the applicant is entitled to a 'free go' at a fresh planning application within 12 months of a refusal and we believe that is what he is doing."

The former King Ecgbert School site

In November 2012 the Council consulted on a draft Planning and Design Brief for the site of the former King Ecgbert School site. The comments have been assessed and, following internal approval, the final brief will be on the Council's website near to the end of February.

The next stage of design work is now being started, based on the Planning and Design Brief. The Council, acting as the landowner, wishes to share these initial drawings with the public. The proposals will eventually form the basis of an outline planning application later in the year. Following this application a developer will be selected and final proposals prepared based around the outline application.

The council is holding two drop-in sessions where you can see a copy of the initial designs, give your views, and talk to the Design Team.

- Fri 15th March, Dore Methodist Church (church hall) High Street 4 8 pm.

Village Greens in Dore

It was in July 2007 that the DVS first approached the Council about having three sites in Dore designated as Village greens. The Council declined to register the land as Village greens on behalf of the community. Therefore, in March 2008 the DVS formally applied to have those three sites in Dore designated as Village greens. It made these applications to protect the sites from future development and to retain them for the benefit of the whole community, which had enjoyed the use of them over the years.

One of the determining factors in any village green application is the power under which the land is held; and some land is ineligible to become a Village green. Ultimately the Council was forced by its own Licensing Committee to seek Queens Counsel advice due to the confusing and incorrect picture of the position which it had portrayed.

The conclusions are that the Recreation Ground is held under the Public Health Act 1875 and the Totley Brook Open Space is held under the Open Spaces Act 1906. Land held under these powers is not eligible to be designated as a Village green. However, having now got this clarity about these sites, at least it shows that both sites are better protected than if they were held under general Council powers. So although not what we were seeking, the whole community can take comfort from the fact that the Dore Recreation Ground and Totley Brook Playing Field have a strong measure of protection for public recreation due to the persistence of the DVS over the past 5 years.

The third site is King's Croft, which has also been used by the general community over the years, and which the Council also opposes. In this case the Council has had to concede that there is no legal impediment to this site being designated as a Village green; and eventually, after much pressure from us, agreed to hold an Inquiry to determine whether or not the site should be classed as a Village green. This Inquiry took place in November 2012.

When, in March 2008, the DVS applied to make the site a Village green no concern had been expressed by Dore Primary School about the inadequacies of the current school area. So the DVS was not aware of the School's concerns when it made the application. It was subsequent to this (in December 2009) that the School decided that it needed to fence off part of the area for which the application was made. Some months after this action, the chairman of the DVS suggested discussions to see if a compromise could be reached, including re-opening the access from Vicarage Lane, but this proposal was not taken up.

As a consequence we are now in the position where the application to designate King's Croft as a Village green is also contested by the School.

If the DVS is successful in its application, then the area designated as a Village green cannot be fenced off in any way. So it would be impossible at that stage for the School to be offered an area of land for its exclusive use.

The DVS is sympathetic to the School's concerns and so in advance of the Inquiry

it proposed a formal compromise to the School, whereby the access from Vicarage Lane was re-opened, leading into and forming part of the proposed Village green. This would mean that the school would retain the larger part of the site that it has currently fenced off, but may have to re-site part of the area currently used as a wildlife area and would have to re-site part of its fence, adjacent to the access, further back towards the School. The DVS offered to provide a financial contribution to the School to assist with the re-siting of the wildlife area. The School did not wish to accept this compromise proposal. Nevertheless, at the Inquiry the DVS amended the area it was proposing as the village green to reflect its compromise proposal.

The DVS applied for village green status in order to protect the area from future development and secure it for the community, and it still sees this as a beneficial proposal for the benefit of the whole community. This compromise proposal was made sincerely in an attempt to produce an acceptable alternative for all parties.

The Inspector at the Inquiry said that she hoped to give her recommendation by mid-January. However, no information has yet been received and the deadline for the production of Dore to Door has arrived; so the outcome is still not known. The results of the Inquiry will be posted on the DVS notice board and posted on its website.

Christmas drink driving figures lower than last summer

As part of an enforcement campaign, South Yorkshire Police targeted known drink-driving hotspots during December. 2,907 drivers were breathalysed and of those 151 (5.2 per cent) tested positive, or refused or failed to provide a breath test.

503 of the breath tests carried out followed a collision on the road, 9.5 per cent of these were recorded as being over the drink drive limit or unable to provide a breath test.

Nationally, the drink and drug drive figures for last December, according to the Association of Chief Police Officers (ACPO) campaign, showed that across the country over 175,000 tests were conducted and more than 7,000 tested positive, or refused or failed to provide a breath test.

South Yorkshire Police also targeted known drink-driving hotspots during June 2012 when 2,763 drivers were breathalysed and out of those 161 (5.8 per cent) tested positive, or refused or failed to provide a breath test. During the same period eight drivers were arrested for driving under the influence of drugs.

Through their annual campaigns, South Yorkshire Police and the South Yorkshire Safer Roads Partnership consistently warn the public, both young and old, that drink driving can kill. The statistics show that younger drivers (under 25) are more likely to commit a drink driving offence than those over 25 and the Police do target their resources accordingly.

So it doesn't make much difference whether it's Christmas or Summer, the Police are stopping vehicles and testing drivers, where a positive result can lead to a lengthy driving ban, possible loss of job and livelihood with some offenders even facing imprisonment.

The Story of the Dore Jubilee Wall Hanging

As many of you will know, Barbara Cassidy of the Dore Quilters Group worked with Dore residents old and young to produce the magnificent Wall Hangings which are currently on display in the main room of Dore Old School as a lasting legacy of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in 2012. 76 squares were produced in total with a theme on each individual square of some image, some person, some place or some event associated with the village. Originally it was hoped to have 60 squares to represent the sixty years of the reign of Queen Elizabeth, but such was the amazing response that a second Wall Hanging comprising a further 16 squares was created.

Without giving too much away, all the squares have been placed in the book (see box), along with an explanation of the craft techniques employed and the theme of each square. The ingenuity and skill of those who completed squares was truly astonishing, with Betty Brown, at 89 years old, being the oldest contributor

It's busy, busy, busy at KES

We are now getting on for half way through the academic year and it has been very busy so far at King Ecgbert School. We were, of course, thrilled with our GCSE and A level results which were the best ever that our students have achieved with 81% reaching the 5 A*-C including English and maths benchmark at GCSE which was the highest in South Yorkshire, and 58% of all A levels at grade A*- B. All our students who wanted a place at university were accepted into a university of their choice by lunchtime on results day. No mean feat according to the problems that were reported in the press.

Work is well underway to aim even higher this year, but that has not meant a reduction in all the other activities that ensure our students receive a fully rounded education. Our sports teams had a very successful evening at the Sheffield Federation for School Sport presentation evening when

25% of all the City awards were made to King Ecgbert teams and students, the Y10 cricket team were celebrated for never having lost a match since they started as Y7 students. All Y12 students have been to Birmingham University to help them start thinking about the process of university applications for 2014 entry. Y13 biologists have been to Filey Brigg for three days to investigate the flora and fauna that thrive on rocky shores and the Y12 geographers have been to North Yorkshire to look at river processes and will be going to Snowdonia in March to look at the lasting effects of glaciations.

In Y10, a range of theatre groups and visiting authors have been into school to bring the plays and novels studied in English alive with live performances. Melvin Burgess talked about the wide range of topics he has called upon for his fiction writing and a production of "An Inspector Calls" supported the Y11 students in preparation for their English Literature GCSE exam.

So a very busy time with much more to

come as the ninety Y10 students involved in The Duke of Edinburgh's Award start to plan their expeditions, which will hopefully take place in more pleasant weather conditions than has been the case in the last couple of years.

DORE 20 is PLENTY

Following recent concerns regarding driving and parking around Dore Primary School we would like to encourage the whole community of Dore to reduce their driving speed to 20mph on Furniss Avenue, Church Lane and the top of Bushey Wood Road. This voluntary pledge will be the start of an ongoing awareness campaign aimed at the whole community to help make "20 is plenty in Dore" in order to protect our children from road accidents. Britain has the highest percentage of pedestrian road fatalities in

Europe. More than half occur on roads with 30mph limits. Speed limits on our urban roads are 60% higher than Europe. Britain has one of the lowest levels of children walking or cycling to school in Europe. British parents consistently blame traffic speed as the main reason why their children are not allowed to cycle or walk to school. Lowering speed limits to 20mph has been found to decrease child pedestrian accidents by 70%.

"DORE 20 is PLENTY" CAMPAIGN

I am willing to back the "DORE 20 IS PLENTY" campaign and will reduce my driving speed to 20mph on Furniss Avenue, Church Lane and Bushey Wood Road so that together we can help protect ALL local nursery and school children from road accidents.



Lady-in-Waiting

The snow code - tips on clearing snow and ice from pavements or public spaces

Don't be put off clearing paths because you're afraid someone will get injured. Remember, people walking on snow and ice have a responsibility to be careful themselves.

Follow the advice below to make sure you clear pathways safely and effectively.

And don't believe the myths – it's unlikely you'll be sued or held legally responsible for any injuries if you have cleared the path carefully.

Clear the snow and ice early in the day

It's easier to move fresh, loose snow rather than hard snow that has packed together from people walking on it. So if possible, start removing the snow and ice in the morning. If you remove the top layer of snow in the morning, any sunshine during the day will help melt any ice beneath. You can then cover the path with salt before nightfall to stop it refreezing overnight.

Preventing slips

- Pay extra attention to clearing snow and ice from steps and steep pathways - you might need to use more salt on these areas
- Use salt or sand not water
- Don't make the pathways more dangerous by causing them to refreeze. If you use water to melt the snow, it may refreeze and turn to black ice. Black ice increases the risk of injuries as it is invisible and very slippery.
- You can melt snow or prevent black ice by spreading some salt on the area you have cleared. You can use ordinary table or dishwasher salt - a tablespoon for each square metre you clear

- should work. Don't use the salt found in salting bins this will be needed to keep the roads clear.
- Be careful not to spread salt on plants or grass as it may damage them.
- If you don't have enough salt, you can also use sand or ash.
 These won't stop the path icing over as effectively as salt, but will provide a good grip underfoot.

Take care where you move the snow

When you're shovelling snow, take care where you put it so it doesn't block people's paths or drains. Make sure you make a path down the middle of the area to be cleared first, so you have a clear surface to walk on. Then shovel the snow from the centre of the path to the sides.

Offer to clear your neighbours' paths

If your neighbour will have difficulty getting in and out of their home, offer to clear snow and ice around their property as well. Check that any elderly or disabled neighbours are alright in the cold weather. If you're worried about them, try contacting their relatives or friends, or if necessary the local council.

Winter services from your local council

Your local council will provide many winter services such as clearing local roads and pavements in your area. For information about your council's winter service, check its website.

A year of the rotary club of Sheffield Vulcan

The Rotary Club of Sheffield Vulcan is part of the global family of Rotary International and works under the motto of "Service above Self" – and does this with fun, fellowship and common aims.

In 2012 we raised over £4000 by organising a sponsored Wye Walk in the Peak District, and a golf day. We have collected for a variety of charities at local supermarkets and given time to help steward the Sheffield half-marathon and Whirlow Hall Farm Fayre.

Since 2000, over 10,000 bulbs have been planted by the club in more than a dozen locations, mainly in the West and South-West of Sheffield and around 1000 more were added last year. As part of the national "Big Tree Plant" initiative, we planted over 300 trees of varying sizes and types in 5 public spaces (The Lord Mayor of Sheffield, John Campbell, joined us at the Parkwood Springs planting session). We have carried out maintenance work on the Round Walk, cutting back overgrown bushes and branches, digging out steps, and generally tidying up.

Every year Vulcan Rotary Club members give around 60 man days of effort to Samaritans Purse, a charity that sends "shoeboxes" of useful items and toys to very disadvantaged children mainly in Europe and Africa. 2012 was no exception, and we transported the boxes into the Sheffield HQ from outlying areas.

Recognising the potential value of our future generations, we work with local schools giving "mock interviews" to help students prepare for the world outside. We also stage an annual debating contest.... and help fund an annual school trip to the panto.

Last year we completed a major international project for an Institute for

deaf children in Indonesia. Our financial contribution was doubled via Rotary International, and the local Rotary Club managed the installation of culinary equipment and the building of a catering block and equipment. Those children now have the opportunity to learn catering and related skills.

We also helped steward at the Rotary "Music In The (Botanical) Gardens" event, and again organised a Christmas raffle for a number of charities (we print the tickets, fund and deliver prizes, and the charities sell tickets and retain most of the income).

This year, we look forward to seeing our bulbs flower, our trees grow healthily, and executing new projects, whether for young people at home or abroad, existing charities and worthy local organisations, or other causes where we can make a difference via "Service above Self".

All the above and more is carried out in a spirit of camaraderie, and we have a number of social events for members, partners and friends. Our meetings are held on most but not all Tuesday evenings at Abbeydale Sports Club (6.30 – 8.30, normally including a meal and speaker), and we know that the pressures of life mean that members cannot make all meetings. We are not concerned with politics, gender, religion, or race – we simply want more like-minded members who feel that they can "put something back" into society and enjoy themselves as they do it.




Matilda Fretwell

The Heritage section of Dore Village Society regularly gets information, artefacts and images passed to them to be made available to people researching their family history, or wanting to know more about their house and who might have lived there in the past.

Recently Jennifer Butler passed this photograph over to us, along with some information about the link between Matilda and Dore.

Matilda was born in 1838, and since she looks quite a young woman



When she retired, Matilda Fretwell went to live in Sycamore Cottage with another niece, Lucy Beatrice Buxton, a music teacher and governess. Lucy played the church organ at Christ Church, Dore. Matilda is buried in the Churchyard in Dore.

Coincidences happen in Dore so if you have read this article and the information rings a bell with you, I would be delighted to hear from you, as indeed would Jennifer. Incidentally, both Jennifer and her sister Linda (Buxton, at the time of course) attended King Ecgbert Girls Technical Grammar School in the 1960s. As a brand new school at that time it was nick-named 'the Crystal Palace in the Hills'but that's a story for another edition of Dore to Door! The Archives and Heritage Collection are open to viewing on the first Saturday of each month from 10 until 12 noon, or by special arrangement at other times. Some of you will not realise that the production of rather splendid Grandfather clocks was carried out right here in Dore. The Pearson family, father and maybe nephew rather than son, were making Grandfather clocks round about 1780. In a conveyance document dated 22nd April 1780 Henry Pearson is described as Clockmaker of Dore, whilst going back to documents from 1762 Henry is described on mortgage documents as being a Cutler. He, along with his nephew Daniel of Holmesfield who is described as a yeoman, had two messuages with shop and smithy at Dore and two closes. A messuage is a house, outbuildings, yard and immediate land. They are described as having 'household stuff, furniture, stock-in-trade, tools, implements.

This clock face belongs to Graham Wheeler who has recently approached Dore Village Society to ask for further information about his clock. Research is difficult on the Pearson clockmakers. Despite several examples of their work actually belonging to Dore residents, Dore Village Society still knows very little about the Pearsons. We would love to find out more.

In 2001 Dore to Door ran an article about the Pearson clocks based on evidence we had at that time. It is believed that Henry Pearson lived and worked in a property to the east of the present junction of Dore Road and Vicarage Lane, perhaps the very property mentioned in the Conveyance (feoffment) document of 1780?

There are other known Pearson clocks which have remained in the village. Are there any more? Do you have any information about the Pearsons' and their clocks?

Original research on the Pearson family was carried out by **John Dunstan**.



The Dore Village Society's annual activities

4. Environment

Following the publication of the Localism Bill in 2011 and

- Pressing for the creation of Village Greens in Dore to protect the area from future development.
- Ongoing work to erect stones commemorating the ancient Village Greens.
- Continuing to advise individuals who would like to keep an eye on particular footpaths and how to go about it.
- Getting the Council to improve drainage in the bottom field of the Recreation Ground.
- Tree planting on the Recreation Ground.
- Overseeing maintenance of the Recreation Ground throughout the year.
- Ongoing work to ensure Blacka Moor maintains its wild character.
- Monitoring and advising regarding the management of Totley Brook Open Space and other Open Spaces.
- Funding the Village Flower tubs installed annually in June.
- Funding the installation of FEW information boards in Ecclesall Woods (work in progress).
- Supporting FEW in monitoring footpaths in Ecclesall Woods and in other activities.
- Providing funding for fluorescent tabards, litter pickers and black bags for willing volunteers to conduct litter picks in Dore as necessary.

SYPTE welcomes HSR announcement

South Yorkshire Passenger Transport Executive (SYPTE) welcomes the Department for Transport's (DfT) announcement for the new High Speed Rail (HSR) network to serve the Sheffield City Region.

DfT confirmed that a station will be built just off the M1 motorway (junction 34), near Meadowhall, as part of the second phase of HSR. Services to the Sheffield City Region (SCR) are due to commence in 2033, but the hard work begins now to make sure that everything is up and ready.

The first and second phases connect the SCR to London, Birmingham and the West Midlands, the East Midlands, and Leeds. Sheffield City Region covers South Yorkshire and parts of north Derbyshire and north Nottinghamshire, including Worksop, Chesterfield and Retford.

The city region's high speed station will bring significant benefits to the region's economy. Research carried out on behalf of SYPTE and Metro (West Yorkshire PTE) showed that High Speed Rail services in Yorkshire would generate an estimated £2.3 billion of local economic benefits on top of the predicted £60 billion of national transport benefits.

By linking the Leeds City Region, the Sheffield City Region and the East Midlands, HSR would connect an area of 6.7 million people and 3 million jobs.

Journeys from Sheffield to London will also be reduced from 2hrs 7mins to 1hr 15mins.

Whilst quicker journey times will bring the capital and the Midlands nearer, opening up new markets and business and job opportunities, the capacity on existing rail lines that HSR will free up is also hugely important to accommodate the growing rail demand in the Sheffield City Region.

Although it will be some time before HSR services begin operations to Sheffield City Region, the benefits could be felt well

before then as businesses grow and relocate to station locations along the route. The M1 location is expected to give a huge boost to the surrounding area, as well as across wider South Yorkshire.

Cllr Mick Jameson, Chair of South Yorkshire Integrated Transport Authority said: "This announcement is the result of a lot of hard work by people across the Sheffield City Region and beyond and is hugely important for our future economic competitiveness.

"The M1 location is already served by bus, Supertram and local rail services. It will help to spread the benefits of HSR throughout the region, using the transport links which have ready access to much of South Yorkshire. It will offer much improved connections to London and the other cities in the Midlands and North. It will also open up many new possibilities for new services to places not currently served when capacity is freed up on the existing network."

Local pub visits a councillor to deliver a petition

A delegation from the Devonshire Arms descended on local Councillor Colin Ross during his Saturday morning surgery. They delivered a several hundred named petition and requested the new pub statutory code is pushed through with more urgency as many local pubs, including the Devonshire, are unlikely to still be trading when it is implemented.

Colin Ross followed up the isues raised in the meeting, "I have discussed this with Nick and he immediately wrote to Enterprise Inns. The reply came in last Friday and I shared this with Tina on Saturday. Basically it just said negotiations are continuing and they hoped to reach an agreement over the level of rent before the court case in April. I have also met with Greg Mulholland the Lib Dem Leeds North West MP who is leading the campaign in the Commons on this matter. He is very keen to do what he can and we are trying to arrange a visit from him to the Devonshire.

In the new plans, struggling pub landlords were promised help recently with Business Secretary Vince Cable announcing plans for an independent Adjudicator to address unfair practices in the industry.

As well as the new Adjudicator Dr Cable also wants to establish a new statutory Code to look at the relationship between large pub companies and publicans, which will be enforced by the Adjudicator. This new Code will ensure fair practices for a number of issues including rents and the prices publicans pay for beer. It would also have the power to investigate and deal with disputes between pub companies (pubcos) and publicans, and in some cases have the power to fine.

In particular, the proposed Code would prevent abuses of the beer tie, which oblige publicans to sell particular types of beer. It would enshrine the fundamental principle that 'a tied licensee should be no worse off than a free-of-tie-licensee' which will ensure a level playing field is maintained in the pub sector.

Nick Clegg commented on the new plans "Pubs are a cornerstone of our community, but many have told me that they have been struggling in recent years thanks to some unfair practices by large pub companies. These new measures will give hard-working publicans a fairer chance at running their pub so they can continue to serve their communities.

Whirlow Farm

Holding a newly hatched chick or bottle feeding a lamb are special experiences that many Sheffield children have shared in at Whirlow Hall Farm.

The farm, which is an educational and environmental charity, is something of a Sheffield institution, the Trust having been founded by local businessman Alan Aiken in 1979. The inspiration came from his evacuation to a farm during World War II, and his dream was to provide inner city children with the same positive experiences of a working farm.

For almost 34 years many thousands of children have been lucky enough to be able to visit and stay on the farm. In fact, there are many instances of second generation families now visiting the farm. But Whirlow is not just a visitor attraction and during their visit the children learn where food comes from and, depending on the season, even get to pick their own vegetables from the field to cook for dinner.

However, the economic climate is raising many challenges for the Trust whose fundraising team need to raise £300,000 every year just to maintain the level of service they provide today.

This is likely to be increased in the next financial year by the expected withdrawal or cutback of a £40,000 grant which they currently receive from Sheffield City Council.




Joan Ward, Head of Fundraising, said 'Although we are looking at sustainable ways of increasing our income by delivering accredited courses to schools and colleges, the fact remains that income generation is particularly difficult for charities at the present time; Whirlow Hall Farm is no exception.

We are therefore asking the local community to rally round to help us in any way they feel able. We are always looking for 'Friends of Whirlow' – a donation of £30 per year will help support the Trust and, in return, friends will receive complementary tickets to open days.

Skating outside

Memories of cold winters in my teens always include skating outside. After a few days of hard frost Longshaw would be frozen solid. You always hoped for a lack of wind, or the surface would be frozen in waves! The main part of the lake away from the trees became an ice hockey pitch and an irregular section around it for figure skating. The reeds hadn't encroached as much as now so there was plenty of room.

At night the moon might be enough light or car headlights were added. Once someone stood a brazier on the path. A group including Mick Wells, Dave Broughton, the Farnsworth brothers and my father and brother Tony would go hurtling around using a mixture of homemade sticks and pucks, school hockey sticks, clip on skates (which had a tendency to fall off your shoes) and proper skates. I was lucky that some elegant tan leather skating boots of my mother's fitted my feet and as I grew took over my aunt's pair. I taught myself a basic waltz, backward skating and so on, but Mr. Broughton was the expert figure skater and always good to watch. It's sad that dog walkers have destroyed the chance of skating on the rare times it's cold enough nowadays. By throwing countless large sticks on the newly formed Longshaw ice for dogs to chase, these become embedded in the surface during a thaw/freeze cycle and are hazardous for skating. Loose surface sticks from the trees can be swept off. We always took brooms. They might be needed in a rescue situation.

When low temperatures held, Forge Dam and Wire Mill Dam were popular skating venues and nearby my school (High Storrs) and last of all being so low, Beauchief Dam. All the Dore contingent turned out for skating there. Richard reckons the ice was solid in the Winter of 62/63 for three months on Beauchief Dam.

St Edmund or St George?

Ask anyone who the patron saint of England is, and the majority will say St. George. Little do they know however, that England's original patron saint was St. Edmund, a truly remarkable Englishman. With the combined efforts of the Crusades and the ethnic cleansing of the English people by the Norman invaders, St. Edmund has slowly been replaced over the years by St. George. So this year on November 20th, don't forget to celebrate St Edmund's Day!

As we all know, the flag of England is the Cross of St George, and this is the flag that has been flown around the world as a show of triumph and strength. But, what about St. Edmund?

St. Edmund was a descendant of the Wuffings and the Wuffing Kingdom of East Anglia. Although accounts of his martyrdom vary, there is no doubt that the people of the time witnessed in their eyes the marks of a saint.

We do know that St. Edmund died an agonising death, and that even after being tortured, he still stayed true to his beliefs.

"In this year the (Danish) host rode across Mercia into East Anglia and took winter quarters in Thetford and the same year King Edmund fought against them and the Danes had the victory, and they slew the King and overran the entire kingdom."

- Anglo Saxon Chronicle: (Version A, written between 877 - 899)

Although brief, the above tells us that England was invaded by the Danes, leading to the death of King Edmund. Some say he was killed on the battlefield, others state that he was tortured and beheaded. Whatever actually happened that day will never be known, however the most magical of those stories has over the years caught the imagination of many people.

It is believed that Edmund escaped from the battle after his army was defeated by the Danish outlanders. Edmund fled to Haegelisdun (Hoxne as it is now known) where he took shelter beneath the Goldbrook bridge (Gold Bridge). It is there that Edmund was finally captured, after the reflection of his spur was spotted by passing newly-weds. The Danes dragged Edmund from under the bridge and marched him to Belmore's Oak, or St Edmund's Oak as it became later known. There he was tied to the tree, whipped and riddled with arrows. Edmund refused to renounce his faith and yield his treasures, stating that he would rather die for his people and his God. It was then that Edmund was beheaded, and his head was taken into the nearby woods and discarded into the undergrowth.

After the Danes had left, the locals came to discover Edmund's decapitated body tied to a tree. They then began a search for days to find their King's head, and as all hope faded, they spotted a hungry wolf guarding Edmund's head, and although the wolf was hungry and cold, it refused to leave. The villagers retrieved the head and travelled back to town under the watchful eye of the guardian wolf. Edmund's head was then placed together with his body in a temporary chapel, which was to become the site of many alleged miracles for visiting worshippers.

Edmund's body was later moved to Beodricesworth, or Bury St. Edmunds, where the greatest miracle was witnessed. It is said that upon opening his coffin they found that his head and body were attached, with nothing more than a small red ring visible around his neck, and that all wounds from the arrows had healed.

Paul comments: "the shop is only about as big as our front room, so we cannot compete with B&Q on depth and breadth of range; but then, we're not a DIY chain. We might not always be able to compete on price, but you can buy the number of screws you want rather than a sealed pack of 100 – so actually costing you less in real terms".

The rise and demise of Community Assemblies

Community Assemblies were introduced in 2009, a year after the Liberal Democrats won control of the City Council, as part of the their Community Involvement Strategy to "put Us in the Driving Seat". Seven in total, each covering 4 electoral wards, they replaced Area Panels which had been in place since about 1995.

Each CA evolved differently, and in 2010 a public meeting was held to compare what worked, and what didn't city-wide. But this well-attended debate wasn't recorded, so most of its positive and negative comments were lost.

Labour won control of the City Council a year later in 2011, and put the future of CAs under review. Various discussions over the next 18 months suggested that public support was dwindling, and that CAs were in need of reform, but no major changes were made.

In October 2012 a public meeting was held by 'Sheffield for Democracy' to discuss the way forward for CAs, and showed remarkable cross-party agreement that changes were necessary. A detailed report was issued, which is still on their website - www. sheffieldfordemocracy.org.uk

The City Council now faces major budget cuts from April 2013, and published its proposals to wind up the existing CAs and replace them with more cost-effective structures. A public consultation on these proposals closed on 28th January, and it's likely they will be implemented in March. But a further consultation is planned to start in April to discuss what new local structures should replace

It's now up to those with an interest in local democracy to engage in this further consultation to ensure a more satisfactory long-term solution with better public scrutiny, and not just another top-down quick fix. Watch this space



In sporting parlance FEC stands for Future England Captain and in cricket I recall that term being applied to Michael Atherton and Michael Vaughan previously. Now it is being applied to Joe Root who becomes the second citizen of Dore to receive this accolade following Michael Vaughan who, of course, went on to captain the England cricket team very successfully. At the age of 22 I doubt he will be the England captain just yet because Alistair Cook is only 28 and he is making a good job of it so far. However, in the future he may very well become the second Dore resident to captain England at cricket and not many villages can claim that!

Croquet might not be on your list of top sporting activities, but it is a fast-growing sport with a number of new clubs opening in Yorkshire and Derbyshire. Two local residents from Dore, Adrian Simmerson and Mike White, were part of a croquet team (Sheffield U3A) that recently finished top of the Yorkshire Croquet League, in their first season, winning all their matches.




